COMMUNITY OF THE TRANSFIGURATION

News & Updates from Stephanie Schultz, Oblate, Community of the Transfiguration

Regularly I have been asked as an oblate of the Community of the Transfiguration, an order of Episcopal sisters, how the sisters are doing? For those that are not familiar, the mother house is in Cincinnati. The community just celebrated their 125th anniversary last August 6th, 2023. Locally, there are 15 or so Associates of the community. Please ask one of them or me about it. You might ask Fr Daniel, Deacon Anne or Deacon Pam for starters. The sisters had a strong presence at Christ Church until 2017.

One of the sister's focus has always been on outreach and their ministries such as Bethany School (K-8) on the campus, and St. Monica's Recreation Center, just down the road (an after-school and summer program for at risk youth). In addition, the Spirituality Center offers spiritual enrichment in the form of retreats and workshops. Most recently, Food for the Soul has sprung up during the pandemic when kitchen staff asked whether they might be able to gather foods in the community and repurpose it into meals for those in need. I will focus on Food for the Soul in an upcoming Chronicle.

What I wish to speak to you about this month is the involvement with the Navaho Nation located near 4 corners in the southwest. Let me give you a little history I gleaned from Sister Jean Gabriel. This ties in with our former Bishop Barry Beisner who is now the Bridge Bishop for Navaho Nation. I recommend Bishop Barry's address to the Diocese of Northern California at the last Diocesan Convention. (See the website norcalepiscopal.org under News and Events.)

Three years ago, the sisters received a request from an organization in South Dakota -Partnership with Native Americans-asking for toys. The sisters had boxes packed for the Dominican Republic (another ministry undertaken by the community) which had been sitting due to the pandemic. Recently, they shipped 20 boxes to South Dakota and 20 boxes to the Navajo Nation where Bishop Beisner is now Provisional Bishop.

Some facts that Bishop Barry shared in his address: Navajo Nation is the largest tribe in the US with 400,000 members, 165,000 living on the reservation and the remainder mostly in rural areas; the median cash income is \$20,000. There is 40% unemployment, 40% of households live in poverty. COVID in the Navajo Nation is the highest in the US. Addiction, violence and the struggle of the people to maintain their culture are some of the other difficulties present here. Bishop Beisner notes it is the responsibility of the entire Church to oversee the wellbeing of it's missionary diocese. He notes that people are living an exciting dialogue between traditional Christianity and their culture. A few of the things needed are lay leaders, Christian education and recovery ministries.

So here is my request should you be able to help. Navajo Nation and tribes in South Dakota need prayer shawls for women, baby blankets, ski caps for men and women, socks and scarves for men. Items can be knit or crocheted. I use a simple prayer shawl pattern that can be found at shawlministry.com. Items can be found in thrift stores, yard sales as well. The only request is that items be in good condition. Bishop Barry says these things are needed and are making a difference.

Minutes of the most recent Vestry meetings, Outreach, and Financial Reports are always posted on the Lewis Hall bulletin board.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 23RD MEETING: This was the first meeting at a **new day and time: the 4th Tuesday monthly at 5:30 p.m.** The meeting was conducted while enjoying pizza, salad, and dessert provided by Elizabeth, Pam, and Peg.

At this regular meeting, after Fr. Daniel, led “In the Early Evening” from the Book of Common Prayer, the first item of business was appointing 2023 Vestry election runner-up Linda (Lin) Chase to the vacated seat in the Class of 2025, expiring after the 2026 Annual Meeting, pursuant to Section 5.4 of the Church Constitution. After the vote, Lin was summoned to join the meeting. This was followed by everyone sharing one personal highlight and one lowlight of the previous month, at Fr. Daniel’s suggestion.

The 2023 Financial Report was reviewed and received with changes. The updated 2024 budget projections were reviewed, and, after additional adjustments, it was adopted by unanimous vote. The Facilities Team report was pulled from the Consent Agenda for discussion of the painting estimate. The remaining written reports, from the Rector, Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Green Team, Joy Mass Team, and Stewardship Committee, were approved.

Fr. Daniel reviewed highlights from his written report. He also commented on the Joy Mass attendance and our Christmas and post-Christmas attendances. Fr. Daniel mentioned that Jan. 11th was the 10th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood, and that the Jan. 28th services would be the 6th anniversary of his rectorate, both of which the Vestry heartily applauded. Fr. Daniel also announced that, in view of St. Alban’s scheduled Shrove Tuesday dinner and concert by Bobby Jo Valentine, we will observe a Shrove Sunday on Feb. 11th.

Senior Warden Steve Preston asked for any questions from his written report, of which there were none. In his final oral report as Senior Warden, he was granted time to highlight that the long-awaited professional energy efficiency survey of the church buildings will be on the afternoon of Monday, Feb. 5th. He emphasized that in the latest Leadership Call from the Bishop’s office, parishioners are urged to complete the Revival survey (linked in the E-News), and especially those from our Deanery. Steve took several minutes to reiterate the importance and urgency of the four recommendations he made in his written report: the urgent need to schedule painting of the exterior of the church’s buildings (given that most companies are booked a year in advance); the need to schedule inspection and re-roofing of our buildings for the same reasons and in light of the need for them to be in new condition if and when solar panels are mounted; the desperate condition of our parking lots and the intervening city-owned alley; and the need to invest in solar panels with battery storage for environmental reasons and in view of an average almost \$2,000 per month in electricity and gas bills, with more rate increases known to be coming. His recommendations included a number of options for paying for these expensive, urgent needs. Finally, he expressed that it had been a true pleasure and distinct honor to serve with everyone as a Vestry member and as Senior Warden.

Likewise, there were no questions on Junior Warden Jim Hendry’s report. He reported that he had visited City Hall, and finally was able to speak with a responsible person from the Public Works Department about the lack of response to correspondence about the hazardous condition of the city-owned alley that runs between

our parking lots. He gave the man a copy of the letters, and was promised a reply. Within a few days, he received a letter which gave the church permission to repave the alley, specifying the city's requirements. Vestry received this information with gladness, and further consideration will be given.

Archdeacon Pam Gossard praised the faithfulness of the three "retiring" Vestry members. She also reported on the pre-ordination retreat that she had led for candidates for Deacon.

Robin Cardona reported on recent Joy Mass services and attendance. Steve Preston pointed out that the Financial Report shows there is \$350 remaining from the \$3,500 ECS grant for Joy Mass.

The Green Team's report was about the upcoming energy efficiency survey on Feb. 5th. Steve Preston reported that the Emergency Response Team Co-Leaders report they have begun working on the contact list in the red Emergency/Disaster Response Binder in the kitchen and posted on the church doors. The Ad Hoc Committee on a Diversity Statement would be meeting on the following Friday, Jan. 26th.

Fr. Daniel, Archdeacon Pam, and Steve Preston updated planning for the Diocesan "Fearless Faith" Revival on April 26-27, 2024, and that Christ Church is still planned as a "remote location." The Revival Worship Planning team would like "to hear where we are seeing love planted and hope harvested in our Diocese! We are asking for short (2-3 minute) videos of how [parishioners] have experienced God's love and grace in daily life, in the church, or in serving others." There is a link in the E-News.

Junior Warden Jim Hendry reported that he plans to hire someone to do the remaining excavation between the Fish Memorial Wall and the office building, preparatory to landscaping. It was suggested again that the Facilities Team might organize a volunteer workday to complete this landscaping project.

Fr. Daniel and Belinda Zander reported on the committee that is planning the Betty Chinn Book Launch event on Saturday, February 10, 2024. More copies of the book have been ordered. Fr. Daniel reported that Patty Hecht of HAPI (Humboldt Asian and Pacific Islanders in Solidarity) has joined the planning committee, and that HAPI will be providing Chinese New Year foods and treats and explanations of the traditional meanings associated with the food. He highlighted the business donations-in-kind being made for the event, including other donated catering.

Fr. Daniel reported on the Personnel Committee's meeting with retiring Music Coordinator/Organist Merry Phillips, and on the committee's agreement on Paul Gossard's draft of a position description for advertising the position. He also reported the committee discussed forming a Search Committee, and a possible chair and members.

Fr. Daniel updated Vestry that the search for a Treasurer has concluded, and that parishioner Francis Rivinus will be nominated at the Vestry Organizing Meeting following the Annual Meeting. Francis has served as parish treasurer in a Virginia Episcopal church, and retiring Treasurer Bob Hines has offered to work with Francis in the transition, and to be available as a consultant as needed.

Vestry received a report from the Nominating Committee (Belinda Zander, Jim Hendry, and Steve Preston). Three confirmed nominees are Ian Haynes, Lyn Klay, and Royal McCarthy. One potential nominee had declined since they may move out of the county this summer or in 2025. The remaining possible nominee had been spoken with and was still considering. So far, three members had self-nominated for Convention Delegate: Robin Cardona, Daniel Hafer, and Steven Preston.

Vestry discussed the Annual Meeting on February 4th, including the agenda, arrangements, and the pre-selection of tellers for the elections. Per the canons and constitution, the Rector selected Steve Cole, the Vestry

selected Jim Hendry, and those two will select a third parishioner; none of the tellers may be nominees for Vestry or Delegate. A light lunch is being catered.

Beginning with the March issue, the writing of this Vestry Page will continue under the pen of Elizabeth Harper-Lawson, who was enthusiastically thanked for accepting this important role of communication and transparency for the Vestry.

Fr. Daniel amplified about his planned pilgrimage to the Diocese of Honduras. He will accompany Canon to the Ordinary Julie Wakelee and Missioner for Church Life Mack Olson on their official visitation from the Bishop's office to our sibling Diocese. They depart on Saturday, Feb. 24th and return on Monday or Tuesday, Mar. 4th or 5th. Their itinerary takes them to many places in Honduras, and includes attending that Diocese's Convention. Fr. Daniel is also coordinating with Mtr. Olga and with Sandy Schultz of Sandy-in-Honduras and hopes this can initiate a relationship between Sandy's ministry and our Diocese. The Diocese has purchased his airfare, and some other expenses will be paid from line-items in the church budget. He is arranging coverage for the two Sundays that he will be absent. Fr. Daniel also announced that he has invited Mtr. Carola von Wrangel from Food for the Poor to be guest preacher on Sunday, April 14th.

In light of Fr. Daniel's pilgrimage, Vestry agreed to change the February meeting to Monday, Feb. 19th, at 5:30 pm in Lewis Hall, to be reviewed at the Organizing Meeting with the new members.

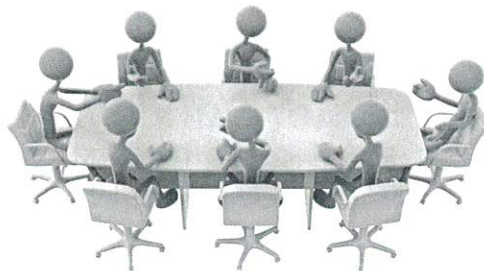
Finally, after discussion of a low bid by a painter to paint three of the main church's exterior walls, it was agreed to ask the Facilities Team to secure two other bids for painting the main church. A couple of known companies were suggested.

After another very full and productive meeting, retiring member and Senior Warden Steve Preston offered the following Celtic Blessing as a closing prayer for each Vestry member and for the Vestry itself:

*May the road rise to meet you
May the wind be always at your back
May the sun shine warm upon your face;
The rains fall soft upon your fields and until we meet again,
May God hold you in the palm of His hand.*

The next Vestry meeting will be on Monday, February 19th at 5:30 pm in Lewis Hall.

ACTION WITHOUT MEETING, JANUARY 28, 2024: At the request of the Personnel Committee, relayed through Fr. Daniel and Treasurer Bob Hines, all nine Vestry members agreed by email to the following motion: "MOVED to amend the 2024 Budget to add a \$2,000 expense line for the costs associated with the search for a Music Coordinator/Organist." (Made and emailed on January 26, 2024 by Steve Preston, and seconded by email on January 26, 2024 by Elizabeth Harper-Lawson. Consented via email by all nine Vestry members from January 26 through January 28, 2024.) An authorization sheet will be signed and dated by all Vestry members for the records of the Vestry, per the Church Constitution.

THE SEASON OF LENT

Early Christians observed “a season of penitence and fasting” in preparation for the Paschal feast, or Pascha (BCP, pp. 264-265). The season now known as Lent (from an Old English word meaning “spring,” the time of lengthening days) has a long history. Originally, in places where Pascha was celebrated on a Sunday, the Paschal feast followed a fast of up to two days. In the third century this fast was lengthened to six days. Eventually this fast became attached to, or overlapped, another fast of forty days, in imitation of Christ's fasting in the wilderness. The forty-day fast was especially important for converts to the faith who were preparing for baptism. In the western church the forty days of Lent extend from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, omitting Sundays. The last three days of Lent are the sacred Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. Today Lent has reacquired its significance as the final preparation of adult candidates for baptism. Joining with them, all Christians are invited “to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word” (BCP, p. 265).

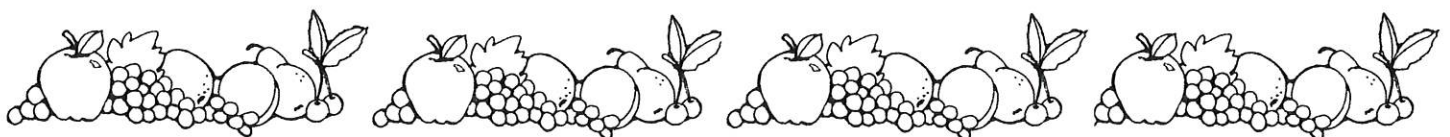
Description

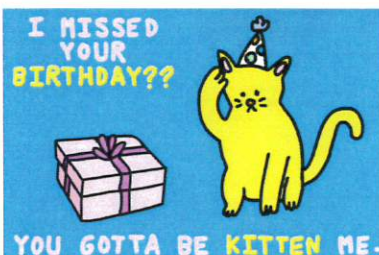


Happy Anniversary

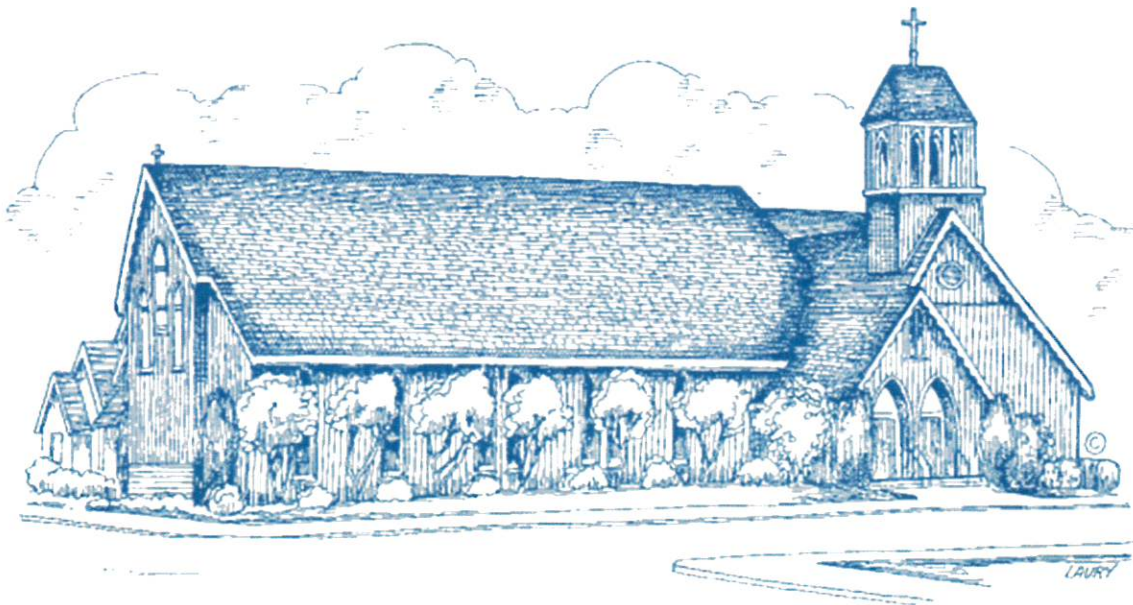
Every Sunday, the Diocesan Transition Committee requests that we pray for our bishop.

Ian Haynes | Vestry Candidate Questionnaire

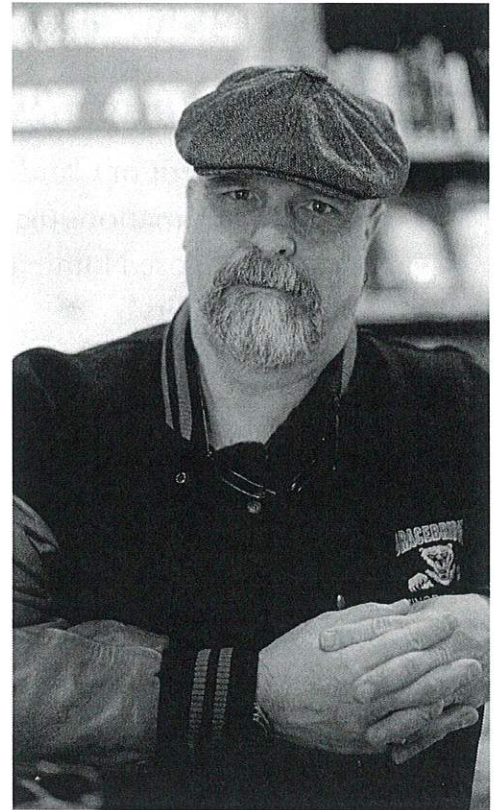

Wherever I am needed.



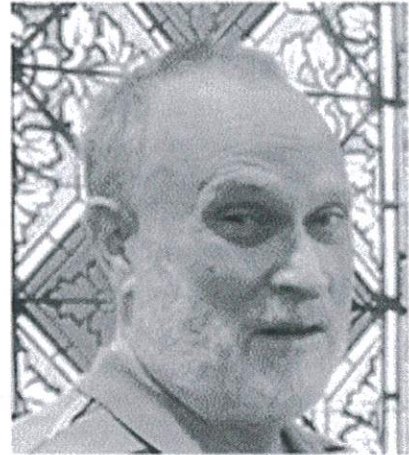

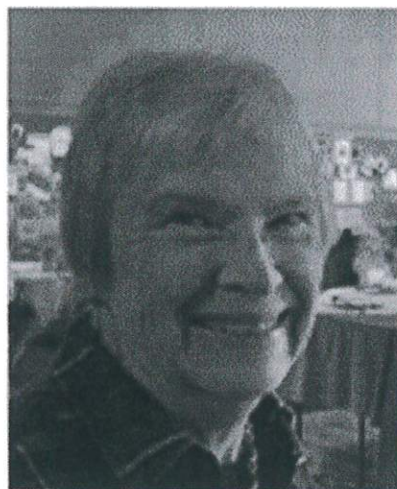

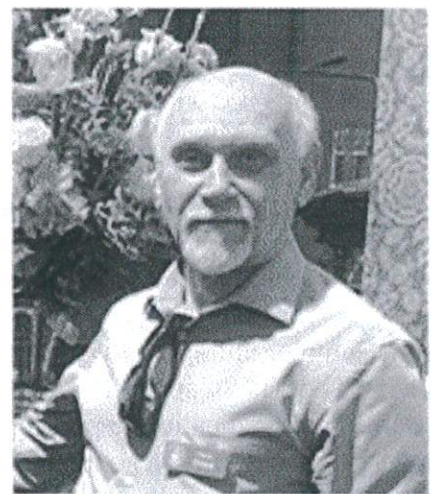

ANNUAL REPORT – The Rev. K. Lesley McCloghrie | Associate Rector

The writing of an Annual Report provides the opportunity to reflect on the events of the year past and so, in my areas of ministry, what were some of the highlights?

The most notable was perhaps the covering of Fr. Daniel's sabbatical. After five years of serving at Christ Church, he left us to enjoy a well-deserved sabbatical time. I had been asked to serve as sabbatical priest in his absence and was very happy to fill this need. It was a joy to once again serve at the altar each Sunday, to preach, and to undertake the many other pastoral and administrative needs of the parish. In these tasks I had the willing assistance of many. Pastors Jeri Gray-Reneberg, Dan Price and Karen Stanley shared in the preaching of God's word, with Pastor Jeri covering the Sundays I was on break. Archdeacon Pam Gossard and Deacon Anne Pierson also preached and helped enormously with parish pastoral care and outreach.

Each week of the sabbatical time, I met with our Senior Warden Steve Preston, to talk over the week's events, address any concerns, and discuss future plans. I found these conversations very valuable, thank you Steve. The absence of the Rector can be unsettling for congregations, and my thanks go to Thomas Swanger our Administrative Assistant, who was not only a great support to me, and but also provided a seamless transition into and out of the sabbatical time. Our regular monthly Vestry meetings continued and we were able to accomplish usual business and many of the organizational tasks asked of us by the Rector.



Our Staff and Worship Committee meetings continued over the summer, and my thanks go to Music Coordinator and Organist Merry Phillips for her support and, as always, for the glorious music she provides to enhance our worship. Thanks also to Kathy Clague and our Altar Guild as well as all our other worship leadership teams. Throughout the summer months the church was beautiful and there was always a full contingent of volunteers to help lead our services.

As the summer unfolded, I was grateful for the continuing work done by our virtual 'engineers', and video vergers, Thomas Swanger, Paul Gossard, Royal McCarthy and assistants Heidi Erickson and Michael Tipton. Their dedication to providing ongoing live streaming of our worship services continues to enrich our parish community in so many ways.

On Sundays July 9 and August 27, we held Coffee Hour Parish Conversations. These were designed to give people the opportunity to share insights, ask questions and share concerns about the parish sabbatical time. The conversations were well attended and productive. On Sunday July 30, Fr. Mack Olson, the Diocesan Missioner for Church Life, visited Christ Church, celebrating the Eucharist and talking with us at each Coffee Hour.

Pastor Karen Stanley and I led a summer lunchtime Bible Study, during which we discussed the scriptures for the upcoming Sunday. These meetings were very well attended, and each week we enjoyed interesting and lively conversation. Thank you to all who participated. Another offering was a short course on Anglican Poetry. I led the reading and discussion of selected works of several poets. These works included those by John Donne, George Herbert, Christina Rossetti, William Blake and T.S. Eliot. Unfortunately, this series was cut short when I contracted Covid.

The work of the Stewardship Team began in earnest during the summer, and continued after Fr. Daniel's September return, culminating in a successful barbeque and auction.

Aside from the sabbatical coverage, I continued my work as Associate Priest at Christ Church, serving as requested by Fr. Daniel. As Regional Dean for the Semper Virens Deanery, I attended the annual Deans'/Board of Trustees' Retreat in Auburn and the monthly Board of Trustees Meetings, luckily held on Zoom. I served at St. Paul's, Crescent City once each month except for our sabbatical time, and at our other local congregations as requested.

2023 was a busy year and a good one, thank you, to one and all.

ANNUAL REPORT – The Rev. Jeri Gray-Reneberg | Associate Rector

At the beginning of 2024 and at the conclusion of my first full year of service, I thank God for the opportunity to be a Priest Associate at Christ Church. It's been a busy year for the parish, with Fr. Daniel's sabbatical and the passing of some dear people whom we all miss, even as we remember their ministries and give thanks for their lives among us. It's also been a busy year for me.

During this year, I participated in many Sunday services and other activities of the parish. In addition, I participated in community and church events and attended both Clergy Conference and Diocesan Convention. I also preached and presided in other congregations as requested and when able.

- Attended both Clergy Conference (Healdsburg, May) and Diocesan Convention (Cameron Park, November)

- Officiated in a committal for a family associated with Christ Church at Sunset Cemetery (January)
- Represented Christ Church in Ferndale at a Peace Gathering led by the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence (January)

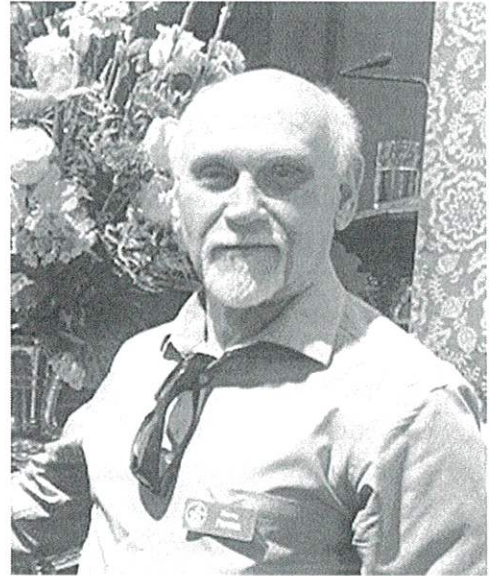

SENIOR WARDEN REPORT – Steven Preston | Senior Warden

When Fr. Daniel appointed me Senior Warden on February 5, 2022, I had four major goals:

1. To support the ministry of our Rector, Fr. Daniel DeForest London, and to watch over the well-being of him and his wife, Dr. Ashley Bacchi (a traditional and primary responsibility of a Senior Warden).
2. To support and encourage the return of parishioners to in-person worship, service, and fellowship as we and the community continued to emerge from the extended isolation of the Covid-19 pandemic.
3. To nurture and support our Lay Leaders as they sought to reinvigorate and re-populate our Lay Ministries as we emerged from the extended isolation of the Covid-19 pandemic.
4. To model “servant leadership” for our Lay Leaders, Lay Ministry members, and parishioners.



During 2023, these goals continued to guide my activities as Senior Warden.

We began 2023 in “Recovery Mode,” both from the Covid-19 pandemic and from the earthquakes on December 20, 2022 and on New Year’s Day 2023 (during our 10:30 service). During 2023, our church life has seemed to return to “normal,” that is, much like things were pre-Covid, even as Covid is still with us. Our attendance at services and events continued to grow, with the return of almost all regular congregants from 2019. And toward the end of 2023, we began to see some new worshippers continue with us with some regularity.

In response to the earthquake devastation in Humboldt County, particularly in Rio Dell and Loleta, parishioners, led by Nellie Thompson, delivered our Project (Re)Start Bedroom and Bathroom Bins to the resource center in Rio Dell. Thanks to generous donations during worship, over \$2,500 in grocery and gasoline gift cards were also delivered for distribution to folks in that area who were in desperate need from the earthquakes.

Major developments at Christ Church during 2023 were our Rector’s Sabbatical Leave, the formation of our Green Team, the development of the new Joy Mass Family Service, the launch of a Vestry Page in the monthly *Chronicle*, a successful Stewardship Campaign, and the hiring of a Sexton.

During the Rector’s much-deserved and much-anticipated **Sabbatical Leave**, from May 22 through September 9, we were guided by our Sabbatical Priest, Mtr. Lesley McCloghrie, assisted by our Sabbatical Team. The Team began preparations with Fr. Daniel in September 2021. During the Sabbatical, we were gifted with the preaching of Mtr. Lesley, Pastor Jeri, Pastor Karen, Pastor Dan, Archdeacon Pam, and Deacon Anne. There was a Liturgical Bible Study on Wednesdays, an Anglican Poetry Series in August, and two Parish Check-In coffee hours. After his joyous return on September 10th, Fr. Daniel shared about his Sabbatical travels and learning, including narrating video slideshows during the Advent Soup Suppers.

Early in 2023, we formed our **Green Team** to lead our church’s response to the General Convention and our Diocesan Annual Convention calls to assess, plan, and implement moves toward carbon neutrality by

2030. Junior Warden Jim Hendry, Vestry member and Facilities Team Leader Heidi Erickson, Senior Warden Steven Preston, and Fr. Daniel London have been on the Team from the beginning. They were joined in March by parishioner Beth Haynes. While taking part in several online webinars about forming Green Teams and various aspects of planning and achieving carbon neutrality, they also formulated a Mission and Vision Statement (which Vestry approved), have been assembling data on our energy usage, facilities and equipment, and preparing for an energy efficiency assessment by a diocesan contractor, which is scheduled for the first week of February 2024.

The Team has also launched a Tip-of-the-Month page in the *Chronicle* (very ably written by Beth), and is laying plans for other projects and events in the parish in 2024. Vestry also approved the Team's request to establish a Creation Care Fund to pay for "environmentally related expenses at Christ Church Eureka," which has already received \$450 in donations, plus the \$1,650 from the Stewardship Auction. (Please see the Team's report for more details.)

One of our major new ministries is the **Joy Mass Family Service**, held in the Chapel every Sunday from 9:30-10:00 am. Conceived by Fr. Daniel, a Joy Mass Team started meeting with him in late January to plan the launch of this children's service on October 1, 2023. A grant of \$3,500 was applied for and approved by Episcopal Community Services of the Diocese, and the funds have enabled the purchase of a computer, television, television stand, supplies, and publicity for the service. Since it started, attendance has fluctuated but has been steady, with the children, parents, grandparents, and other adults experiencing a joyous time of worship and community-building.

With visuals on the 75" TV, guitar-led singing, fun story-time, a meaningful confession and offering, a simplified Eucharist, and a snack afterward, children and adults alike are finding new meaning on a Sunday morning. As Fr. Daniel said in the *Times-Standard* article on September 30th, the goal of the Joy Mass Family Service is "to provide a new, fresh and fun way for children to come to Jesus and to give them the greatest gift they'll ever receive: a relationship with the living God." We will continue these services, and hope that over time they also bring new families into the larger life of Christ Church.

In June, we launched the **Vestry Page** in the monthly Chronicle newsletter, listing the members of our Vestry, and re-capping, in article form, the deliberations and decisions from the previous month's Vestry meeting.

Thanks to the faithful and dedicated work of our **Stewardship** Committee, a successful BBQ Luncheon Pledge Campaign "kick-off" was held on Saturday, October 14th, with the in-gathering and blessing of 2024 pledges on the first Sunday of Advent, December 3rd. It was themed "Rooted in Abundance" and used free materials from TENS (The Episcopal Network for Stewardship). We can report that members of our congregation responded enthusiastically, with pledges for 2024 of \$266,370 (as of December 31, 2023), a 4.8% increase over 2023 pledges of \$254,230. There were several new pledgers this year as well.

At its evaluation meeting on November 29th, the Committee agreed to continue its work throughout the year, and is planning to sponsor a parish workshop in the spring on budgeting, estate planning, and planned giving. All the 2023 committee members have agreed to continue on the committee in 2024. (Please see the committee's report for more details.)

And finally, in December we welcomed a **new part-time Sexton**, Mike Robnett, who also works part-time at St. Alban's Arcata. His faithful work relieves many lay volunteers of custodial duties, while adding polish to our worship environment. Hiring a Sexton has also produced significant savings over the commercial cleaning service we had been paying.

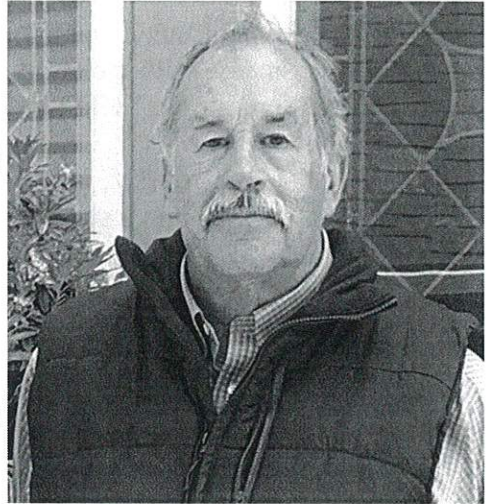
We give thanks to God for the presence of the Holy Spirit, nurturing us into all grace.

JUNIOR WARDEN ANNUAL REPORT – Jim Hendry | Junior Warden

It has been an exciting year being the Junior Warden on Christ Church's Vestry. As you may know, the Junior Warden is one of the people responsible for maintaining the safety and viability of our Church facilities. Our facilities include the Smullin House at 1404 H Street, Eureka, the Transfiguration House (and Church Rectory) at 1633 D Street, Eureka, and the main Church and Lewis Hall, Office/Apartment, Education Building, Zander Room which includes the Choir Room and meeting room and the Chapel of our Merciful Savior all located at 825 15th Street and H Street, Eureka.



Many years ago, the Smullin House was gifted to the Church. It has had a variety of uses over the years but for some time, as an outreach to the community, is rented to a non-profit organization who helps others in need. The Smullin House will soon require painting. The bids that have been obtained are between \$23,000 and \$30,000. No work has progressed to date, but we should not neglect it for long.

At the Transfiguration House, we have been more successful. The earthquake last winter caused cracks in the sheetrock downstairs and in the stairway, and spackle in the rounded corners was broken and fell off. This damage was repaired when the Rector was on Sabbatical. The front porch, in sad shape, was removed and disposed of. The framing was re-leveled, and new cedar planking was installed and stained.

In the Church itself, new sound speakers and microphones were added to enhance the high quality of our live streaming capabilities. A new ceiling light and wall switch was installed in Lewis Hall to illuminate the new icon, and names were placed under the paintings of the twelve disciples also hanging in Lewis Hall. A wall mirror was installed in the new Choir vesting room created in the Education Building. LED lights were installed above the sink in the Pierson Room, and an electrical socket was added by the white board in that room. A broken opaque glass panel in the Chapel was replaced by sandblasting a clear piece of glass. At our 15th Street entrance, a broken security light was replaced, and a broken downspout in the Chapel Courtyard was repaired. Before the beginning of the Joy Mass service, the Chapel sign was moved from the lawn along 15th Street and reinstalled in the corner of 15th and G Streets.

Activities with our Church apartment began with evicting the renter due to months of non-payment of the rent. We disposed of all things left behind, and had the apartment professionally cleaned. The entire apartment was repainted, and the stove, refrigerator, and washer were replaced. Replacement of the single pane windows was considered, but due to Historical Heritage requirements, was not undertaken at this time. A dead-bolt lock was added to the kitchen door, and smoke alarms and CO2 detectors were installed. A rope ladder was provided for upstairs window evacuation, and a fire extinguisher was placed in the kitchen if needed. The low-level toilet in the Church office was replaced with one that is ADA compliant.

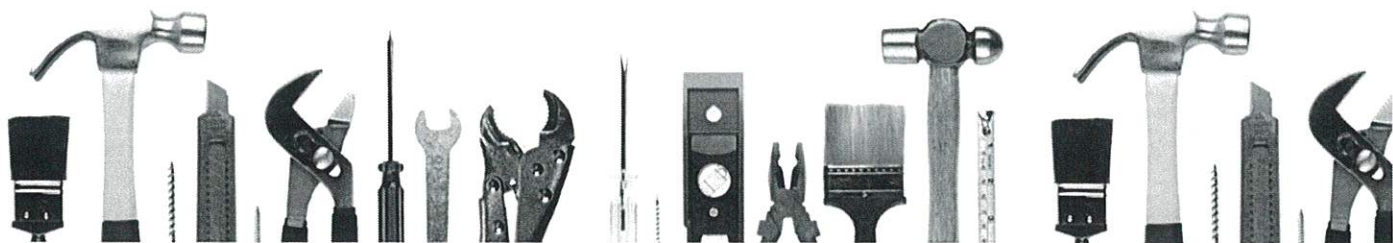
The Facilities Committee, led by Heidi Erickson, was busy during the summer of 2023 when members of the Church came out and spent a Saturday (more than one) weeding the church parking lot and other areas of the grounds. Due to the work of Steve Preston, John and Vickie Patton, Francis and Gigi Rivinus, Lyn Klay, Bev Olson, Julia Lawson, Thomas Swanger, Kathy Clague and many others who gave their time to help beautify our church facility, including Peg and Howard Gardner who kept us well hydrated. Since then, Julia Lawson has been sweeping, cleaning and keeping the Saints Martha and Mary's Courtyard looking beautiful on a weekly basis. Also, Elizabeth Harper-Lawson has joined the group and is the point person for the upcoming Transfiguration Yard project that will happen this year.

Also, during the past year, Heidi Erickson and I met with a painter to discuss the cost of painting the parts of the church building that need painting the most. The estimate will be forthcoming.

The Church carport was in need of attention and the rusted metal pipes supporting the roof were replaced with 4" x 6" pressure-treated posts on new cement footings. Handicapped parking was relocated under the carport, with tenant parking alongside.

With consideration of paving our parking lot at 14th and G Streets, in April I sent a letter of inquiry to Eureka City Hall about the condition of the city-owned alley between the lots. No reply was received. In November, our Office Administrator sent the same letter from the Church computer followed with a snail mail letter. No response whatsoever. At the end of December, I made a personal visit, to City Hall offices, explained our case to the guards at the counter, and eventually a gentleman from Public Works came downstairs to talk with me. He said no emails or snail mail letters had been received. Luckily for City Hall, I had a copy of the letter with me, and presented it to him. The next day I received a reply, which has been shared with the Vestry, saying we could pave the alleyway, using a Grade-A paving contractor in accordance to City standards. I should have asked him if we could pave only a portion of the alleyway. One step at a time, but now we have a contact at City Hall along with his desk phone number!

Every Junior Warden knows it is a never-ending job and that it takes a team of people to keep our campus maintained and loved. I appreciate having had the opportunity to contribute to this important ministry.



ACOLYTES & EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS – The Rev. Anne Pierson | Deacon

The Acolytes and Eucharistic Ministers have been a wonderful group. They have consistently stepped forward to serve when needed, sometimes with very little notice. They are truly a team and I so appreciate their willingness to serve. I hope the church, and all of you reading this report, are aware of and appreciate their ongoing service this past year. Thank you, team!!

If any of you, reading this report, are drawn to serve as either an Acolyte or Eucharistic Minister, let Father Daniel, Archdeacon Pam, or me (Deacon Anne) know. Our team would appreciate having more people serving in these ministries to make the service lighter for all.



ALTAR GUILD – Katherine Clague, Director

On Sunday, February 12 following the 10:30 a.m. service, Fr. Daniel and Senior Warden Steve Preston huddled with current Altar Guild members and potential members. We had a good discussion about the sacred nature of the Altar Guild work, as well as review of responsibilities and procedures. The meeting was a good time to review plans for Lent and Holy week which is one of the busy times for the Guild.

We have added new members this past year; Beth Haynes and Barbara Walser. This has allowed us to have rotating teams for regular weekly duties. For Easter and Christmas, we take a “all-hands on deck” approach and members help each other’s teams during these busy liturgical seasons.

The Altar Guild has prepared for all Sunday services, four funerals, and all liturgical seasons. We added the Joy Mass Family Service to our weekly schedule. Elizabeth Harper-Lawson and Robin Cardona set-up for the Joy Mass services.

We polish silver and brass, fill, or replace candles, prepare communion, manage the consecrated reserve, change paraments, wash vessels, wash & iron linens, order & pick up supplies, arrange for altar flowers, prepare traveling Eucharist kits, and manage liturgical set-up for Christmas, Ash Wednesday, Holy Week, Easter, and Pentecost.

We do our job week after week and ask for help with climbing ladders, hauling heavy boxes, and anything else beyond our physical means. In 2024, we look forward to recruiting additional members. Nevertheless, whatever our membership, we provide liturgical support necessary to the functioning of the church, we manage to accomplish whatever preparations and follow-ups are expected for all services on the church’s schedule. **And we are glad to do it!**

CHRIST CHURCH CHOIR – David Powell | Choir Director

This year, the Christ Church choir was once again back to its full capacity in its role at Christ Church: Providing musical leadership to the congregation by providing weekly anthems glorifying God and echoing the words and ideas presented during services throughout the year. The choir works diligently to enhance the worship experience of the congregation, not only through their offering of anthems, but through their leadership and support in singing the hymns, psalms, and liturgical music with and for the congregation.



Over the last year, the choir has presented over 40 anthems during services, as well as several special services throughout the year. The choir works not only during the weekly rehearsal sessions, but members continue to work on their own time as well. This is a sacrifice of time and energy offered freely by the passionately generous members of the choir, and their offerings elevate our services because of their care and time.

This year the choir was able to grow, seeing several new members join us. We celebrated the addition of four new members into our ranks, we saw the return of a couple of former members as well, and we mourned the loss of one of our own.



It has been a year of growth for the choir, not only in numbers but in the level of difficulty of the music that is being offered. This is again due to the diligence of the individual members of the choir, and we are incredibly fortunate to have so many wonderful people involved.

COFFEE HOUR MINISTRY – Lynne Dougherty Bean | Coordinator

Following a successful Food-4-Fellowship campaign in 2023, the number of coffee hour volunteers have increased greatly. As a result, we are able to continue to welcome members and guests of Christ Church to fellowship following our 10:30 Sunday services. I am so appreciative to all those who added their name to support this important ministry! We continue to look forward to adding new volunteers who might also be interested in joining us.

FOOD FOR PEOPLE | The Food Bank for Humboldt County – Bev Olson

I took 720 pounds of non-perishable items along with 7 nice can openers during 2023. My goal for the year was 600-700 pounds which we more than met.

The goal for 2024 will be 800 pounds – we can do it and set a record for our parish!

GREEN TEAM – Elizabeth Haynes | Team Member

The Green Team was established by the Vestry prior to the 2023 Annual Meeting. Beginning with the Annual Meeting Parishioners were invited to join the team. Founding Members included Fr. Daniel London (with Mtr. Lesley serving during Fr. Daniel's sabbatical), Sr. Warden Steven Preston, Jr. Warden Jim Hendry, Facilities Team Leader Heidi Erickson, Elizabeth Haynes and Tom Bond. Owing to scheduling conflicts, Tom Bond was excused from the Team but has remained as a resource as needed. The Green Team held its first meeting on April 22, 2023. Subsequent meetings were held June 11th, August 6th, September 17th, October 8th and November 12th.

At the June meeting the Green Team prepared a mission and vision statement that was approved by the Vestry. This statement is now included in all Green Team communications. In August, Daniel Moyer from St. Alban's Creation Care Team addressed our Green Team and provided an overview of the decarbonization process undertaken by St. Alban's. His advice and experience have helped focus the Christ Church Green Team activities.

During the summer, the Green Team began preparations for an energy efficiency needs assessment that will be conducted in early February 2024 by Energy for Purpose, the diocese approved provider. Monthly energy usage, as represented on utility bills, has been compiled into a single document that will be submitted prior to the needs assessment, along with detailed lists of site information including square footage, heating systems, lighting fixtures, etc.

Beginning in October, the Green Team implemented the Tip of the Month inclusion in the Christ Church Chronicle. These tips highlight practical actions that anyone can undertake to save money, use green alternatives to single-use products and make Creation Care part of everyday life.

The Green Team was formally introduced to the parish at the Stewardship Barbecue, and proceeds from the Stewardship Silent Auction were placed in the Creation Care Fund for the needs assessment. This fund was established by the Vestry, at the request of the Green Team, as a means of setting donations aside specifically for costs associated with Christ Church's efforts to become carbon neutral. Since its establishment, parishioners have made specific contributions to the Creation Care Fund and we look forward to seeing it grow in the future.

In 2024, the Green Team looks forward to planning fundraising and educational campaigns, as well as taking practical steps towards reducing the Christ Church Carbon Footprint and working towards making Christ Church a carbon neutral resiliency center for the members of Christ Church and the greater community as a whole.



Creation Care Fund: Thanks to your generosity, the Creation Care Fund already has \$2100.00 dedicated to the needs assessment and other efforts towards making Christ Episcopal Church carbon neutral.

Green Team Mission Statement: *In fulfillment of Diocesan Resolution R1-2022, General Convention Resolution A087, and our church mission statement, the Christ Church Green Team promotes care for the earth and its resources as God's gifts for sustaining life. We strive to minimize the environmental footprint of the parish and its people by honoring the land and practicing mindful stewardship of our planet and its resources. As Christ Church Eureka, we seek to provide a carbon neutral presence by the year 2030.*

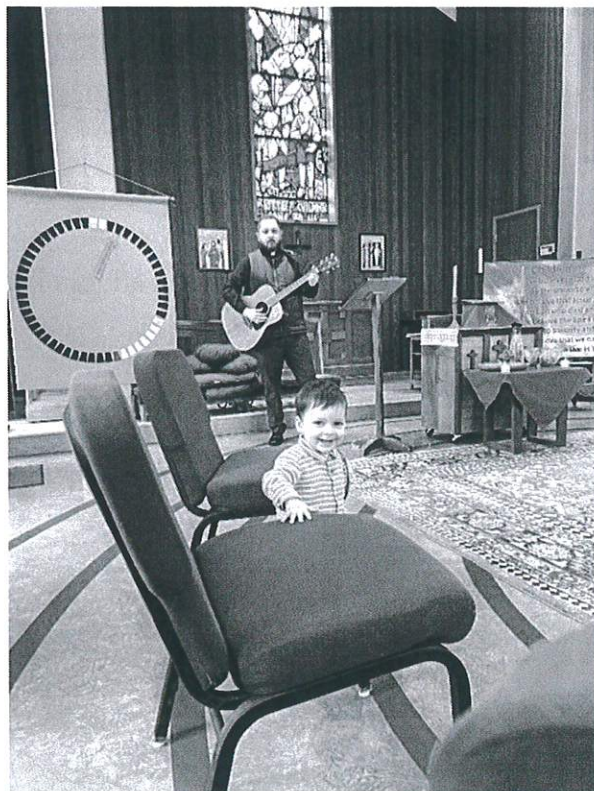

MUSIC PROGRAM – Merry Phillips | Music Coordinator and Organist

A New Kind of Harmony

The word *kosmos* in ancient Greek means “a harmony of parts.” In his prologue to *A New Harmony*, John Philip Newell describes a growing awareness of “the earth’s essential interrelatedness” in nearly every dimension of life as a “new-ancient way of seeing” (Newell, p. vii). The “new harmony” he describes is one that unifies the Spirit, the Earth, and the Human Soul. According to Richard Rohr, the book “represents what is becoming a new and abundant source for theology, although it is the oldest source of all – creation itself!”

Harmony is a word with many different meanings. It is an important word in the language of music, used to describe a pleasant musical sound made by different notes being played or sung at the same time. Even when notes are played or sung in unison, a pleasant harmony may be created by voices with different timbres, or the sound of different instruments.

Harmony may also be used to describe an agreement of ideas, feelings, or actions, or a pleasing combination of different parts. We strive for harmony in our actions and relationships with others. We like it when things seem right or suitable together.

When we come together to worship, we are part of this new harmony – we recognize “a oneness we did not create but have been gifted with. It is the rediscovery of a harmony that precedes us, the remembering of a unity that is deep in the body of the universe” (Newell, p. 132).

One of my favorite quotes, which I’ve used in past annual reports, is “music gives wings to worship,” taken from a chapter title in William Bradley Roberts’ book *Music and Vital Congregations*. It encompasses a hypothesis that I’ve enjoyed exploring since I began my tenure at Christ Church – that “at the center of a successful music program is a vital connection between music and the life of faith” (*Nourishing Your Congregation’s Musical Life*, by Linda J. Clark). Two facets of this connection are: “expression” (how music expresses our faith) and “formation” (how music forms our faith) and transforms us.

We came together and worshipped in a variety of ways throughout 2023, and for each of those services a number of dedicated musicians prepared music including our choir (the heart of our music program) and choir director, David Powell, instrumentalists (Paul Gossard, Grey Brothers, Jake Schulz, Thomas Swanger), and vocal soloists. Thank you all for the beautiful harmonies you created and shared with us!

The Music Program

The work of planning and preparing worship services falls to many folks. We have a “Music Team” (Fr. Daniel, David Powell, Paul Gossard, and I) – the team meets weekly or as needed. The larger, expanded Worship Committee (clergy, musicians, and lay leaders) meets once or twice a month to discuss and plan both the liturgy and music for upcoming services. And throughout the year it is always fun to receive suggestions from members of the congregation for hymns and ideas for worship. Keep them coming!

Christ Church Concerts, Music Events, and Outside Musical Groups

The Christ Church Concerts planning group continued to meet and plan concerts sponsored by Christ Church. Concert organist, Ken Cowan, returned to Christ Church for a concert on January 15, 2023 – to a full house and enthusiastic audience. The summer series “Sundays at 4” continued and all three programs were well attended:

- June 25 – The Pitts Family
- July 23 – The Scotia Band
- August 27 – Colors of the Organ (with artists David Lochtie and Sanford Pyron).

On December 10 we held a Messiah Sing-Along, something we had not done for several years. It was also well attended and received.

The concert planning group currently is comprised of Doug Moorehead, Steve Cole, Elizabeth Harper-Lawson, Lyn Klay and Jim Hendry, Grey Brothers, David Powell, and Merry Phillips. Many thanks to all of these folks for their dedication to offering concerts to the community. They not only help plan concerts, but they do much of the work needed to make the concerts happen. Many thanks also to Royal McCarthy and Paul Gossard who give of their time to provide the sound system needs for these concerts.

Christ Church hosted several concerts by outside music groups this year including: Chamber Players of the Redwoods, Bach On! and the Eureka High School spring choral festival and winter concert. Thanks to all who helped host these events! And special thanks to Thomas who has taken on the paperwork involved and to the Vestry committee that formulated the new facilities request procedures and fee schedule.

Continuing Education and Personal Growth

In January I treated myself to the “Seven Days of Singing” Challenge with the Stay at Home Choir (a virtual choir I sang with during the pandemic). The “challenge” was to:

🎵 Reboot your vocal health ; 🎵 Create great habits for 2023 ; 🎵 Set fun goals

I’m not a great singer, but I really enjoy singing. The old saying “if you don’t use it you lose it” applies just as much to singing as anything else and just like playing a musical instrument, singing requires discipline and practice. I have read and can confirm through experience that singing on a regular basis leads to a better ability to audiate which in turn can increase your keyboard skills. So I sing in the shower a lot!

I also challenged myself by accepting an invitation from Humboldt’s newest string orchestra Bach On! to play in their spring concert. We performed one of the Handel organ concertos and it was so much fun to play with such a talented ensemble.

In April, the Church Music Institute offered an online workshop on “The Artistic Language of Hildegard von Bingen,” presented by Rev. Kathryn Johnson. I have been fascinated by Hildegard ever since hearing a recording of her music by *Anonymous Four*. The morning workshop was an exploration of the music of Hildegard von Bingen with suggestions on how to use it liturgically. And we learned about the life of this amazing woman, known as Saint Hildegard and the Sibyl of the Rhine – Benedictine abbess and polymath, writer, composer, mystic, visionary. I especially enjoyed learning some of the words that Hildegard created, such as *Veriditas*!

When a forest does not green vigorously
then it is no longer a forest.

When a tree does not blossom, it cannot bear fruit.

Likewise a person can not be fruitful without the greening power (veriditas) of faith. . .

May John Philip Newell’s “new harmony,” his unifying approach to a “new-ancient way of seeing,” enrich our music program over the next year and may music continue to “give wings to [our] worship.” And may our musical offerings continue to not only be an expression of our faith but serve to transform us through the greening power (veriditas) of our faith.

OUTREACH – Reaching Out with Helping Hands and Hearts at Christ Church Eureka

- Collecting non-perishable food donations for those with food insecurity weekly and especially on the first Sunday of the month, delivered by Bev Olson.
- Donating fresh produce on the third Sunday for the noon dining program at St. Vincent de Paul, delivered by Roni Carlson.
- Crafting prayer quilts for parishioners in need of comfort and healing and making fleece blankets (throws) for children and youth entering foster care, during monthly meetings of Quilters Plus.
- Collecting consumable supplies for kitchen and hygiene use for the Deanery summer camp, Camp Living Waters in Redwood Valley and providing some volunteers.
- Providing new underwear and socks for Betty Chinn to distribute to homeless middle and high school students to enable them to participate actively in physical education classes.
- Ordering back-to-school backpacks to fill with school supplies for Betty Chinn’s outreach program.
- Contributing additional financial support with special Sabbatical Donations to groups we support.
- Donating toward the purchase of a generator for St. Paul’s, Crescent City, to enable them to continue with a feeding program impacted by a major loss of power from their Oregon power company.
- Observing St. Francis’ Day by delivering pet food to the Humboldt County Animal Shelter.
- Inviting the community to share in a variety of musical offerings and concerts, including some that feature the Kegg organ.
- Welcoming families in our community with young children to our new weekly Joy Mass Family Service at 9:30 each Sunday in the Chapel.
- Supporting Discretionary Funds for Fr. Daniel, Archdeacon Pam and Deacon Anne to enable them to respond to urgent needs of parishioners and others.

- Continuing to provide and enhance our online presence through streaming services, weekly emails, social media posts.
- Bringing joy to a local family, parents and four children, at Christmas by responding to some of their needs and wishes, and with a few surprises as well.
- Initiating planning for the February 2024 Book Launch at Christ Church for the community to celebrate with Betty Kwan Chinn and parishioner and biographer Karen M. Price, the publication of The Gray Bird Sings: The Extraordinary Life of Betty Kwan Chinn. Book proceeds will benefit the Betty Kwan Chinn Homeless Foundation.

Indeed, there is more that we do as a congregation and as individuals, and there is much more we could do. Do you see where you fit in? Would you like to do more? Ideas to share? You'll find it a blessing for you, as well, when you reach out and serve others!

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE – Steven Preston | Committee Chair

Stewardship is simply the effective management of the resources committed by someone into the steward's care. We believe that all that we have, and all that we are, are gifts of God, and that our gifted time, talents, and treasure are for the benefit of the Commonwealth of God on this earth, through the presence and ministry of the Church.



The mission of a Stewardship Committee is to foster parishioners' stewardship of their time, talents, and treasure. This includes the annual pledge campaign, sometimes special fundraising campaigns, and stewardship education and opportunities within the parish.

In 2023, our Stewardship Committee began meeting in August, under the leadership of our Sabbatical Priest Mother Lesley, to plan our annual Pledge Campaign, centered on the theme "Rooted in Abundance," using the free materials from TENS (The Episcopal Network for Stewardship). This year's "kick-off" was a noontime BBQ Luncheon on Saturday, October 14th, instead of an evening dinner, with the in-gathering and blessing of pledges on the First Sunday of Advent, December 3rd.

We can report that members of our congregation responded enthusiastically, with pledges for 2024 of \$266,370 (as of December 31, 2023), a 4.8% increase over 2023 pledges of \$254,230. There were several new pledgers this year as well.

The Stewardship Auction on October 14th raised \$1,650, which the Vestry had dedicated to the Energy Efficiency Assessment to be conducted under our Green Team's supervision. Table donations in excess of \$300 were also received to help defray the costs of the luncheon.

The Stewardship Committee met on November 29th to review the pledge campaign and to look forward to 2024. The committee decided to meet on an ongoing basis, at the call of the chair, and to sponsor a parish workshop in the spring on budgeting, estate planning, and planned giving. The committee is open to exploring other ways of fostering parishioners' stewardship of their time, talents, and treasure in 2024.

The 2023 committee members included: Mtr. Lesley (during the Sabbatical), Fr. Daniel, Kathy Clague, Peg Gardner (Pledge Secretary), Daniel Hafer, Beth Haynes, Ian Haynes, Jim Hendry, Lyn Klay, Royal McCarthy, Steve Preston (Chair), and Annalee Veach. Many, many thanks for their dedication and hard work. All have agreed to continue on the committee during 2024.

Special thanks to Parish Administrator Thomas Swanger for providing administrative support to successfully execute the 2023 pledge campaign.

Compensation Ranges include a 5.80% COLA approved by the Board of Trustees (BoT) for 2024. The COLA is recommended to parishes to adopt. The board understands not all parishes will be able to pay this full amount. They encourage parishes to offer what they can.

Compensation Ranges include: regular salary, housing, allowance for social security, etc. The ranges do not include health insurance, travel, pension, education, etc.

Transitional Deacon should be paid at 90% of Range "B" Base (100% when ordained a priest).

Diocesan executive staff are paid at Range "E"; program staff are paid per hire letter.

All other ordained clergy, if employed by a congregation must be compensated at Range "B" or greater. This is prorated based on full time equivalent.

For regional missionaries combine total points from each church. Below 120 points, minimum is Range "B" Base plus \$1,500. For 120 points and higher, minimum is Range "C" Base plus \$1,500. Maximum is Range "C".

For Congregations receiving assistance, maximum clergy salary is Range "B" Base.

Statement of Activity (pages 3)

The General Operating Fund had a surplus for the year ended December 31, 2023, of \$5,870, \$24,790 more than budgeted.

General operating fund income for the year ended December 31, 2023, was \$317,063, \$12,623 more than budgeted.

- Pledge offerings for the month of December were \$26,597 and for the year to date were \$359 more than budgeted.
- Total other giving is \$7,731 more than budgeted.
 - Other givers of record and Loose plate offerings of \$3,770 more than budgeted.
 - Parishioners made in-kind offerings of \$3,646 which we did not include in the budget.
- Investment income is \$5,381 more than budgeted. The total budget for the year is \$8,000.

General operating fund costs for the year ended December 31, 2023, were \$311,193, \$12,176 less than budgeted.

- Diocesan apportionment was \$4,186 less than budgeted. The computation of the apportionment is based on no surplus or deficit. This difference is related to the favorable budget variance reported above.
- Personnel costs were \$6,123 less than budgeted.
 - Interest expense on the rectory was less than budgeted.
 - Rectory costs were less than projected.
 - The budget included property taxes for the rectory of \$4,500. The Church did not pay property taxes due to the welfare exemption.
- Occupancy costs were \$2,766 more than budgeted. Gas & electricity are \$2,569 over budget and water & sewer are \$805 more than budgeted.
- Other general operating costs have a \$7,150 favorable variance.
 - Kitchen supplies are \$698 more than budgeted. Most kitchen supplies are in-kind donations and we do not budget them.
 - The budget included Lay ministry formation of \$1,500 that we did not expend.
 - The budget included expenditures for the Deacons of \$4,000 that we did not expend.

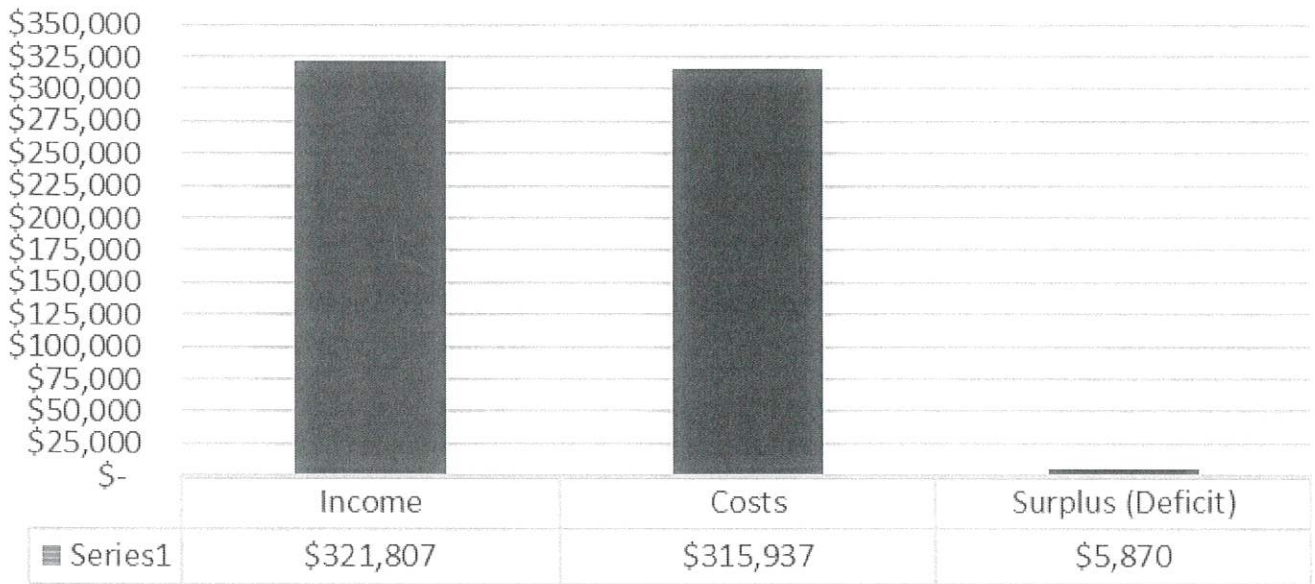

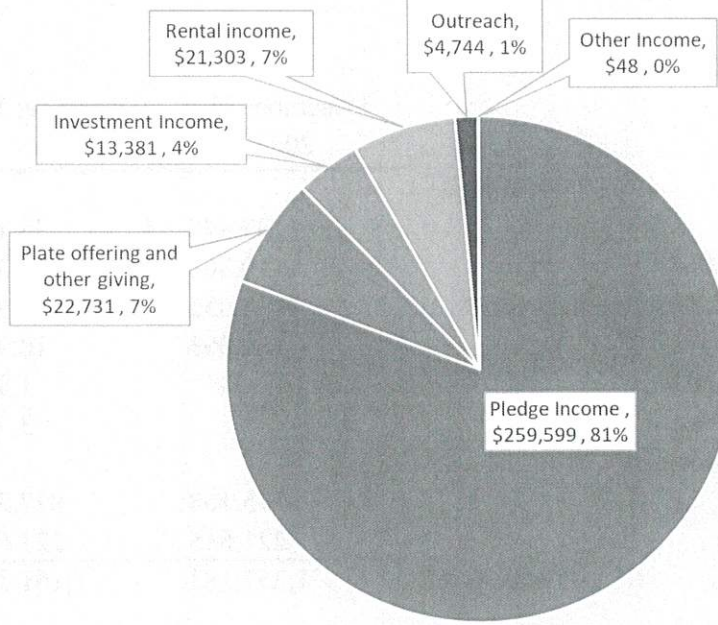

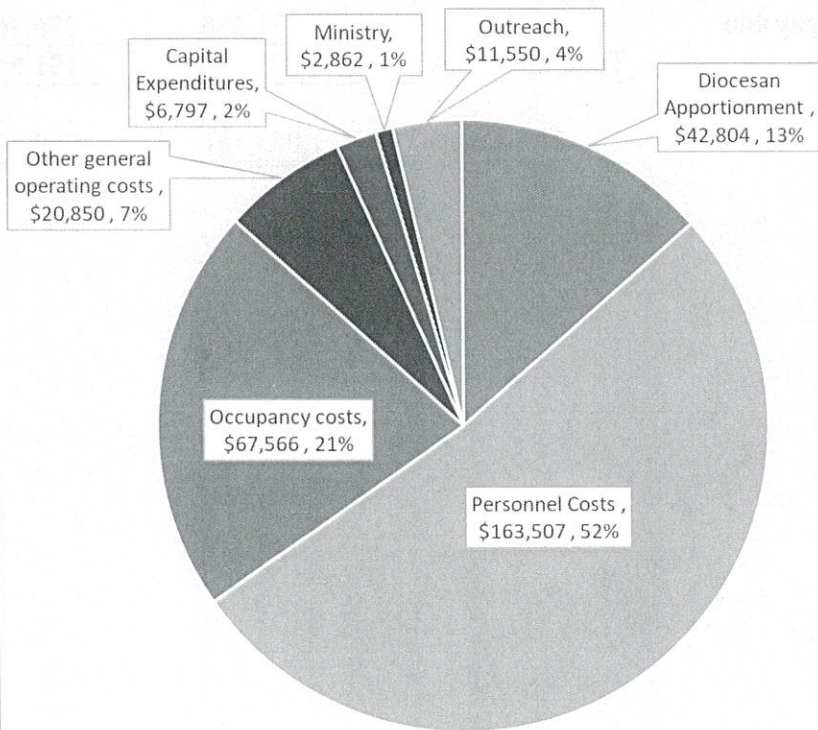
GENERAL OPERATING FUND STATEMENT OF ACTIVITY FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2023

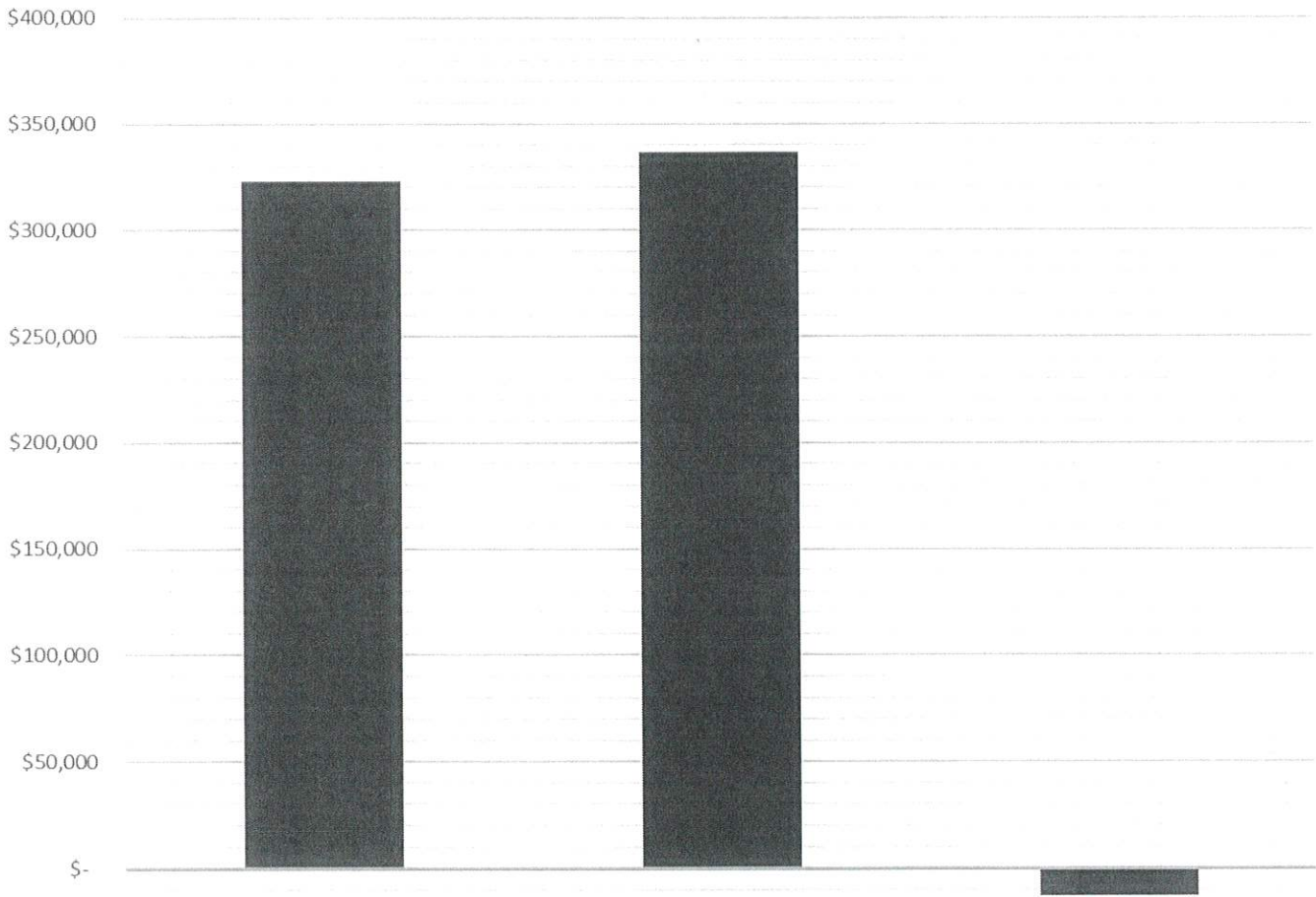

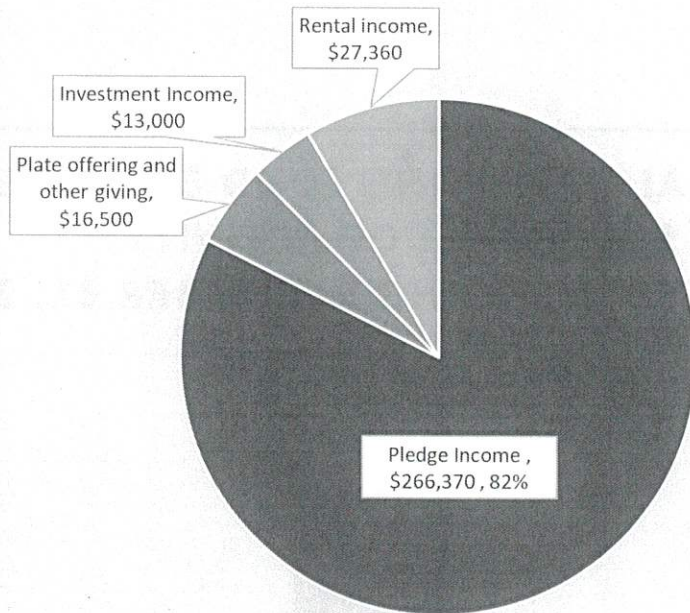

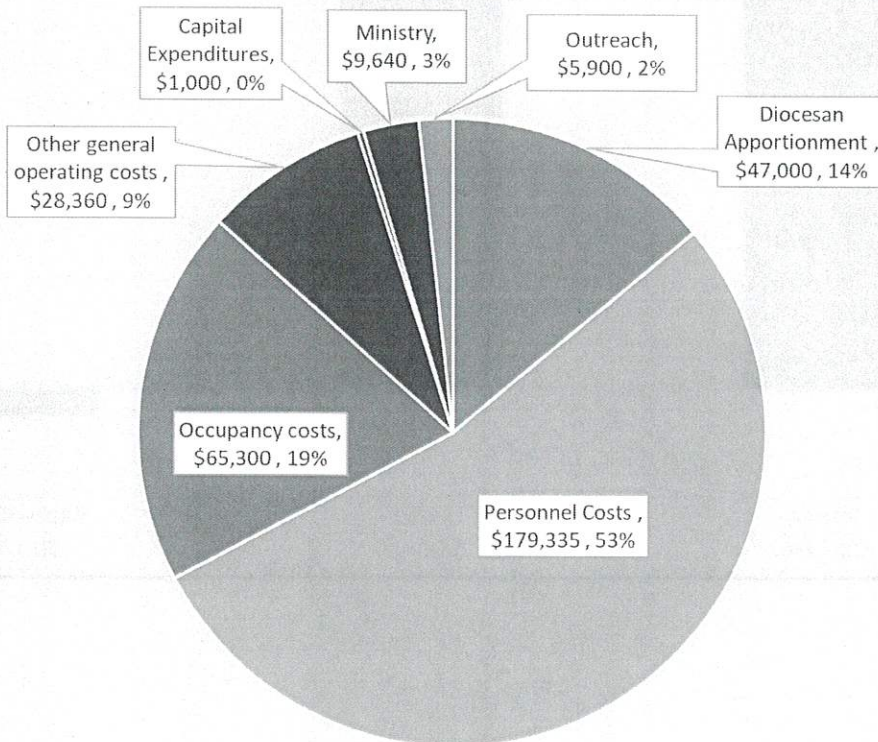
